## Yule' be impressed with this effort by the sophomores



**Seniors:** Now that the application rush is over and we have acceptance letters coming in, it's time to start thinking about paying for college. Scholarship opportunities are available, and although we post what comes to the guidance office (Local Scholarship tab on the blog), there are many resources out there that never reach us. Also, revisit your college list and research institutional scholarships that you may qualify for.

If we have received acceptance and/or merit aid, your child's Naviance account should reflect this information. Under the Results column (under the Colleges I'm Applying To tab) you will se a pencil. Clicking on the pencil allows you to change "unknown" to other options. The left side of the screen gives an option to see Scholarship Applications. Any merit aid awarded (that we know about) will be reflected there. Please remind your child to thank the teachers that wrote their recommendations. This is a non-contractual service and our teachers put a lot of time and thought into what they write. As I'm sure you know, a small gesture of appreciation goes a long way!

We are very excited to share a new dual enrollment articulation agreement between Brookdale Community College and Communications High School affording seniors the opportunity to take classes on a college campus. This release-time program (for courses on the Neptune and Wall campus') can provide students with the opportunity for a campus feel, and may provide transfer credits to colleges who would not otherwise accept transfer credits because they were taught at the high school. As part of this dual enrollment partnership, students may take one released-time class or up to two classes on their own time (including the Lincroft campus.) Please call the guidance office for additional information.

**Juniors:** The spring SATs and ACTs will be here before you know it. You must register for the test on the College Board or ACT website. Every time you test, you are entitled to send four free score reports to colleges. If you are not sure of college choices yet, but are considering playing a sport in college, then send the scores to the NCAA. If you are considering a military academy or ROTC program, then the scores should be sent to them. Even though there is now "score choice," some colleges prefer that all of the scores be sent.

Thank you to all the parents who rearranged their schedules to come in and speak with us about college planning. Junior year is a time for testing and research, and we hope to have provided you with the information you need to start this process. We ask that you stay in contact with us as we journey together to find a school that will challenge your child academically, provide an opportunity for personal and career growth, and not break the bank!

Juniors, Sophomores and Freshmen: The SAT Subject Tests are one-hour-long exams that give you the opportunity to demonstrate knowledge and showcase achievement in specific subjects. Colleges use SAT Subject Test scores to gain insight into your academic background and achievement in specific subject areas. In general, you'll want to take SAT Subject Tests right after you've completed the recommended course work because the material will still be fresh in your mind. You can check the recommended preparation guidelines for each subject test at SATSubjectTest.org. Did you really enjoy World History, Biology, or Physics? Now may be the right time to test.

Summer programs and internships are an excellent opportunity for you to explore your interests and hone your talents. Start planning now for a summer experience that may be right for you. Here are a few summer opportunities that we recently received information on: Rutgers University's Mason Gross School of the Arts provides intensive programs in music, dance, and visual arts for students to explore, create, and perform under the guidance of New Jersey's most distinguished teaching artists.
